Steve Chuckra is the President of the Lehigh River Stocking Association (LRSA). LRSA is a nonprofit dedicated to the restoration and restocking of the Lehigh River. Their goal is the continuous improvement of the waterway and its tributaries. Owen Franklin is the Pennsylvania State Director for The Trust for Public Land, a national nonprofit committed to creating parks and protecting land for people.
